    - Safe Storage gun locks provided through City of Flint partnership with County
      - Locks available at the Clio Road Service Center on June 7 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.
      - Locks also available at State Police Post during normal business hours
    - Extreme Risk Protection Orders
    - Domestic Violence Protection law
    - Universal Background Checks
    - There are weekly trainings on Thursdays and 8 a.m. through End Gun Violence Michigan's website
    - City will also be hosting a "Train the Trainer" Session at the Gloria Coles Flint Public Library on June 28, from 10 a.m. noon in the Flint Central AB Room

## **Electrification of Flint Neighborhoods**

- Presenting on: What does it mean for our homes and commercial buildings to be completely reliant on electric energy?
  - o Presenters: Maggie Striz Calnin, Nick Thomas, Lauren Mixon, Jeffrey Hoang
  - Presentation shared via email to FNU members with meeting notes
- Residential Electrification
  - Michigan Public Service Commission to date has approved nearly \$50 million for low-carbon energy infrastructure enhancement and development projects – current grant covers Ann Arbor, Grand Rapids, Highland Park, Flint, Lansing, Benton Harbor, Traverse City
    - This project ends in June
  - Hope to address energy burden, reduce carbon emissions, and more
    - Benefits to residents: cost savings, healthier & safer homes (air quality), environmental justice/equity
    - Benefits to community: job creation, environmental health, modern/resilient infrastructure
  - What does an electrified home look like?
    - Solar panels, battery storage system, heat pump HVAC, induction cooktops, LED lighting, electric vehicles, high-efficiency appliances
- Local Examples MI NextCities Initiative
  - Have so partnered with 6 homes across Flint to learn and support wider adoption
  - Shell of home matters in what works best; for instance, adding battery back-ups or ensuring roof structure allows for solar panels to sit on southern edge where they'll receive most light
  - Smart panels are also available to help determine energy usage throughout home

- o Should always ask for a "Manual J" Calculation regarding HVAC
- What about renters?
  - The current program is currently for single family homes, but looking to grow scope
  - Aware that many landlords are not incentivized to make electrification improvements as renters are usually the ones just paying for utilities that would otherwise be more efficient and less costly, anyway
- There is a "Michigan Energy Efficiency and Building Electrification Cost-Benefit Analysis Toolkit" which should be live any day
  - NextEnergy is available to help walk people through this
- NextEnergy's team also hosted a Workshop & Discussion with FNU members in the room and on Zoom during the meeting
