### **Eliminating Medical Debt**

Pastor Monica Villareal, Greater Flint Task Force on Social and Racial Equity

- Medical debt is incurred because crises happen. It's the leading cause of bankruptcy.
- Undue Medical Debt program is a model that erases medical debt for large groups of patients by matching donated dollars with qualifying debt. It partners with heath care providers and debt buyers to purchase medical debt.
  - To be eligible to for relief under this program, must be earning 4x or below the federal poverty line have medical debt that is 5% or more of annual income
- We're the last municipality in Michigan still awaiting a vote on this initiative
- Medical providers do need to opt in to working with Undue Medical Debt program
  - This will require further outreach through community

- Debt needs to be roughly a year old and deemed uncollectable at present, but Pastor Villareal sees sustainability model through voting on the initiative now, getting initial uncollectable debt paid, and building on this partnership to continue on after initial funding structure
  - Individuals don't need to sign up; Undue will buy a portfolio and send you a letter noting the relief

#### **MTA Update**

Joseph Kapper - SRF Consulting Group, Inc.

- Have been conducting primary route study for about a year. Started by looking at
  existing conditions and service performance. It's been over a decade since last
  comprehensive look at MTA routes in this way. Also gathered information from
  community input meetings, MTA board and staff, etc.
- Key Takeaways:
  - o MTA riders tend to have lower incomes and do not own vehicles
  - Most transit trips are not for work, but commuting is most common purpose
  - Expanding service north and east of Flint can better serve People of Color who live in Flint
  - Downtown-oriented bus service leads to many people needing to transfer as most report wanting to go to destinations outside of downtown
  - Most transit travel occurs between 9 am and 3 pm but a significant number of trips occur into the late evening (when retail/restaurant employee shifts end)
- Some Survey Feedback:
  - Requests for a wider service span (hours)
  - More frequent service every day of week
  - Service expansion to further edges of Flint
  - More frequent stops, bus shelter improvements
- Goals of service design:
  - Serve transit-using communities
  - Improve coverage, reliability, transfers
  - Reduce travel times
  - Increase ridership
- Guiding principles of redesign:
  - Simplifying routes
  - Improve route directness
  - Provide service in both directions on a route
- Presented Scenarios:
  - Intended outcomes of Scenario 1:
    - Network-wide 30 minute frequency for most of the weekdays
    - Modify existing routes to improve directness and user-friendliness
    - Focus allocation of resources in areas of highest need and demonstrated transit demand
    - Maintaining no-transfer from residential areas to conveniences

- Intended outcomes of Scenario 2:
  - Address known route-specific reliability and coverage challenges that require additional investment
  - Fill gaps in existing service area
  - Establishing more robust crosstown service with transfer points outside of downtown
- o Intended outcomes of Scenario 3:
  - Improve span of service
  - Establish high-frequency network
  - Address remaining reliability issues

# City of Flint

- Ambulance service is up and running, two are activated and one is spare
  - Kwame Hogan, with the city's Fire Dept., spoke on how the program is going thus far; responded to 1,400 calls in the first 3 months
- Recently increased firefighter pay
- Feedback from community members:
  - o Illegal gunfire during new years was extraordinary, what's being done about that?
  - Increase in hit and runs and violent car crashes, what's being done about this?
- Mayor Neeley noted the gun buyback/destruction program; city will provide active shooter training upon request
- Buick City site development is going well and more investments are to come; teased potential \$62 billion

#### **Genesee Conservation District**

Blake Harrity, Community Forester

- Urban forest is all the trees within a city's boundaries; it's not "traditional" forest, but is a highly managed/maintained forest
- City of Flint works with GCD to manage street tree population throughout city, conduct tree inspections and communicate with residence about care to be performed; use specialized software for tracking trees; GCD and private contractors manage the care
- Tree canopy provides needed cooling to paved city areas; work to plant in areas of high heat
  - Trees can also increase property value 3.5-15%
  - Absorbs sound and reduces flooding
- In 2014, 62% of trees were maple trees; planting oak, sycamore, and other trees to improve tree diversity and create resiliency against disease
- Flint is a Tree City USA!

- Using a \$5m grant over the next 5 years to develop workforce, plant 7.5k trees; and train, trim, remove over 2,700 trees.
- GCD provides technical assistance on private and public trees; youth education
